# **National News Notes**

Bureau of Economic Analysis (July 30, 2020) -- Second Quarter 2020 GDP Report

- The report says "advanced estimate" which means the numbers could be adjusted in the near future. It does NOT mean the numbers are incorrect or far from actual. A revised report inclusive of more data will be released on August 27, 2020.
- The US economy shrank at an annual rate of 32.9%. That rate is annualized, which means under the current trajectory, this is where we would be a year from now (YOY). Looking at non-annualized numbers, GDP is about 9.5% smaller than it was last quarter.

Formal WARN notices accounted for more than 400 layoffs in the Cincinnati region this week. The permanent layoffs from both P.L. Marketing and Fusite do not appear to be continuations of earlier layoffs only now being reported while the other two are extensions of earlier furloughs that are no being reported due to duration/permanency.

Note: Due to reporting differences between the Cincinnati region's three states and the federal government, not all data is available for the same date. All numbers are subject to revisions after publication.

At this point, job recovery seems stagnate, and reporting differences across our three states and the federal government is making real-time direct comparisons challenging. Each week counties in our region seem to hold relatively steady in terms of additional initial claims. Each respective portion of our region saw an overall decrease although some counties saw slight increases. Ohio and Kentucky also experienced falling initial claims as a state, while Kentucky experienced an increase.

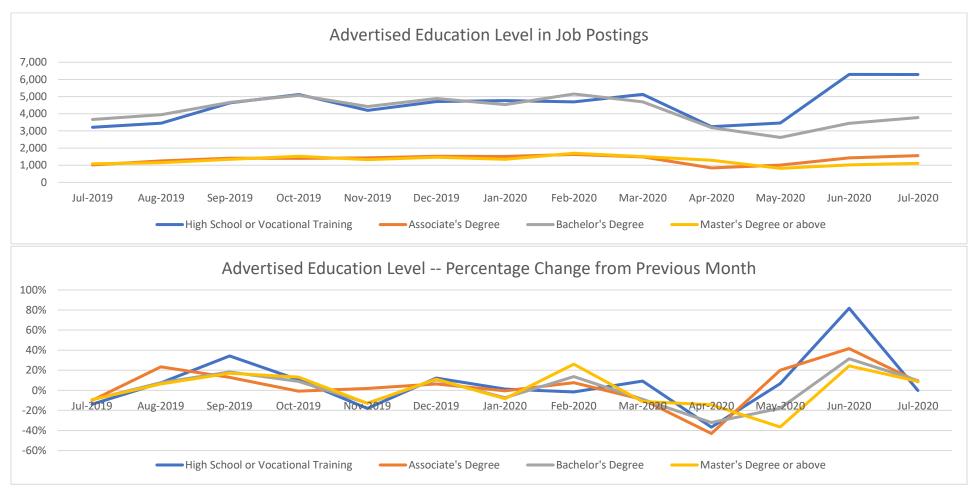
Continued claims continue to see insignificant changes week to week among each of our counties reporting data. Overall, Ohio and our region's counties within the state saw a very slight decrease in total claims. Kentucky saw a slightly more aggressive decrease while Indiana saw a significant increase. Overall, this paints a picture of little change among the volume of unemployed persons in the Cincinnati region over time for the last few weeks.

### **Hiring Needs**

As many trends seem to be returning to pre-pandemic levels (albeit not always at the same volume) this section has changed from previous reports. Moving forward, this section will include a different job demand topic each week of the month reporting on monthly data. Topics include remote workers, industry demand, occupational needs, and opportunities by education level.

#### **Advertised Education Level Over Time**

Demand for all education levels dropped during the shutdown in the Cincinnati region from March to April. Beginning in April and continuing through June, postings looking for those with high school or vocational training saw the sharpest increase in demand. All other education levels saw an increase, but not as nearly as sharp of an increase. Since the shutdowns most heavily impacted shopping, services and restaurants, this pattern of demand post-shutdown makes sense as the majority of occupations in those types of establishments do not require a formal degree.

This week was again a mixed bag with 10 local stocks gaining and 11 losing. Overall, the largest decreases were among our region's financial sector with Fifth Third being the outlier with 1.4% gain over last week. E.W. Scripps, Medpace and Meridian Bioscience all saw gains of more than 5% and Procter & Gamble stock prices hit an all-time high.

Meridian Bioscience, Cincinnati Bell, Kroger, AtriCure, Medpace, Workhorse, Air Transport Services Group, Hill-Rom Holdings, Hillenbrand, Procter & Gamble, and the Nasdaq composite all remain above their mid-February levels at the market high. It is important to note that during this time, Cincinnati Bell announced it would be acquired by Macquarie Infrastructure Partners for \$2.9 billion which drove up the stock price during this time period.
